

The RELATEDNESS of the Second Commandment (3, 4-6)

Is the second commandment really a second commandment—distinct from the first?

The first commandment addresses the false gods of worship. The second commandment addresses the false modes of worship.



King Jehu did not wipe out "the worship of the golden calves at Bethel and Dan" (2 Kings 10:29). He kept the first commandment but not the second.









Pěsěl = an "image" or "idol"



Pěsěl = an "image" or "idol"


Temûnāh = a "form," "shape," "likeness," or "representation"

The worship of the one true and living God was never to be directed toward an object.










The RADICALNESS of the Second Commandment (4b-5a)

Yahweh does not want to be represented by an image of anything in his creation.


Israel had been rescued from Egypt to serve Yahweh. To serve other gods, then, was not only disloyalty, it was to reverse the exodus and go back to bondage.












The RATIONALE of the Second Commandment (5b)

Motive clauses are a hallmark of biblical law (unlike other ancient law codes).


That Yahweh often takes the time to explain his rationale says something about his character, not to mention the value he places upon his people.



The RATIONALE of the Second Commandment (5b)

The root $qann\bar{a}$ appears in the OT 85x and has a wide range of meanings.

God is "jealous" in the sense that he is the one who rights all wrongs—rising up in holy anger if necessary to avenge, vindicate, or undertake for his people.


The RATIONALE of the Second Commandment (5b)

Idols do not and cannot represent and reflect the character of God because God is infinite, perfect, and full of life.

Deuteronomy 4:15-20

An idol is a lie about God.





The RETRIBUTION of the Second Commandment (5c)

Is God so vindictive and impulsive as to punish innocent people for their ancestors' moral crimes?

The text is not suggesting God punishes three subsequent generations for the sins of the first generation (cf. Deut. 24:16, etc.).




The RETRIBUTION of the Second Commandment (5c)

Punishment falls specifically on "those who hate me" (v. 5), not arbitrarily on those in a family's future generations.

The appeal of idolatry is "comfort" and "control."






The REWARD of the Second Commandment (6)

God will hold his people accountable for their idolatry, but he is gracious to those who obey him in this regard.

Families can get unstuck spiritually with any generation that is faithful to God.







God does not want to be misrepresented by those who claim to belong to him.


God wants to (and has the right to) define himself.

The REVELATION of the Second Commandment

God has the right to tell us how he wants to be worshiped.




The REVELATION of the Second Commandment

I need to cast out every false notion I have of God.


The RELEVANCE of the Second Commandment

The RELEVANCE of the Second Commandment

I must keep in mind that Ezekiel 14:7 refers to "idols of the heart."

I must know that while God will hold me accountable for my actions, he is more eager to bless than punish me.
